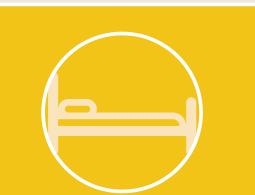

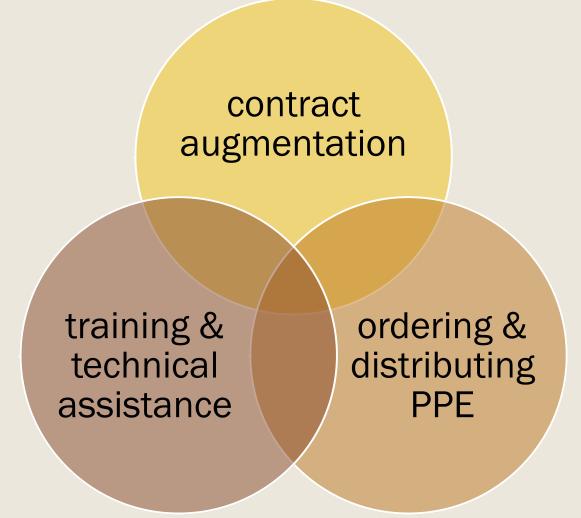

### **RECOMMENDATION** Prioritization

RANK	STATUS
1	COVID positive – any age
2	Under public health/medical investigation, pending test OR has recently been exposed to a COVID positive person. (regardless of symptoms and age)
3	65+ years and pre-existing health conditions with symptoms
4	65+ year OR has pre-existing health conditions with symptoms
5	Any age with symptoms
6	65+ years with pre-existing conditions, no symptoms
7	All ages with pre-existing conditions, no symptoms

### RECOMMENDATION Existing Shelter Support

Existing shelters play critical role to provide continued support to people experiencing homelessness and serve as referral sites for people in need of isolation/quarantine as well as "step down" shelters for people exiting an isolation/quarantine unit.



## **RECOMMENDATION** Isolation/Quarantine Shelter Expansion

Medically Supported Isolation Care Centers

- $\bullet$  Priority populations 1 & 2
- Lead on-site staff = medical
- DHS project coordinator

### **Preventative Quarantine Units**

- Priority populations 3 5
- Populations 6 & 7
- Lead on-site staff = contracted provider
- DHA project coordinator

## RECOMMENDATION Encampment Response



 ✓ Enable people living in encampments to remain in place safely

 Provide a pathway to isolation shelters for people who are unsheltered

# CoC Funding – State COVID-CoC

- Receiving \$1,083,737 of State COVID-CoC
- Recommending approval as part of the overall \$15 million funding plan for existing shelters, expansion of quarantine/isolation shelter capacity, and an encampment response.

## CoC Funding – CoC HEAP

- Recommending approval of \$1 million of funding from the CoC HEAP to be re-allocated to the COVID-19 Homelessness Response Team efforts.
- Funds currently allocated for the County Flexible Housing Pool (FHP) program, to be back-filled with CoC HHAP funding.
- HEAP funds have more flexibility and a broader range of eligible activities, including funding for food, water sanitation stations, and outreach.
- Swapping the HEAP FHP for HHAP FHP allows the FHP program to continue to serve clients beyond HEAP deadline of June 30, 2021.

- Re-allocate \$499,290 from Access and Diversion and \$500,710 from Prevention to FHP Re-Housing.
- Anticipate greater need to build capacity for re-housing.
- Can still improve access and standing-up a diversion program.
- Does not preclude include funding for prevention in the future.
- The need to leverage other available funding sources will become increasingly important.

## **CoC** Funding Recommendation

Staff recommends the CoC Board approve the following actions:

- A. Approval of the State COVID-CoC funding for implementation of the Sacramento COVID-19 Homelessness Response Plan, which includes funding for existing shelters, expansion of quarantine/isolation shelter capacity, and encampment response.
- B. Approval of reallocating \$1,000,000 from CoC HEAP funds from the Flexible Housing Pool project (HEAP "rental assistance or subsidies" eligible activity) to a new project COVID-19 Response (HEAP "services" eligible activity)
- C. Approval of reallocating \$1,000,000 from CoC HHAP funds from the Prevention and Access and Diversion projects to the FHP Re-Housing project.
