Background

The CoC Board has previously had two committees focused on the Coordinated Entry System (CES), the CES Committee and the CES Evaluation Committee. The former was formed in 2013, prior to the launch of the CES standard assessment (VI-SPDAT) in 2015 and has continued to meet regularly over the years. The latter was formed in 2018 and was charged with the evaluation responsibilities outlined by HUD in the CES Compliance Checklist. In addition to somewhat differing scopes, the key difference between these committees is their membership structure: the CES Committee membership structure is informal, with no appointed members, while the CES Evaluation Committee members were formally appointed by the CoC Board in 2018. The two committee have been meeting jointly since 2019, led by the CoC Board-approved Chair, John Foley.

CES Committee Purpose and Scope

The Coordinated Entry System Committee oversees the design and implementation of the local coordinated entry system (CES) and evaluates its functioning and impact on improving access and connection to services to resolve homelessness. Responsibilities include:

- In consultation with ESG jurisdictions and CoC recipients, establishing policies and procedures, including specific policies to guide operation for persons fleeing domestic violence, to ensure HUD requirements and local goals are met;
- Developing performance metrics and evaluative tools;
- Regularly seeking feedback from providers, consumers, and others; and

- Reporting regularly to Sacramento CoC Board and broader CoC community on access, resources, and functioning.

Member Roles and Responsibilities

The role of committee members is to represent their constituencies and the broader CoC community. The commitment to this committee is ongoing, with the expectation that members will serve an initial two-year term which can be renewed. There are no term limits on CoC Board committees. The CES Committee meets monthly, on the second Thursday afternoon of the month and meetings are currently held via zoom. Member responsibilities include reviewing materials prior to meetings, attending meetings, advising staff in advance if a meeting will be missed, and following up on any additional commitments the member makes over the course of the committee's work.

SUBJECT: City of Sacramento 2021-2029 Housing Element – Policies and Programs

Addressing Homelessness

Summary

The Housing Element is part of the City's General Plan and sets forth the policies and programs to address the housing needs of all households in Sacramento. It serves as the City's eight-year housing strategy and plans for the housing needs of all economic segments of the community through a comprehensive analysis of need, constraints, and resources as well as policies and programs to address those needs. City staff have begun the process of updating the Housing Element for the period 2021-2029, which has an adoption deadline of May 15, 2021.

The goals, policies, and programs section of the housing element is the heart of the City's strategy for addressing its housing needs. Staff have developed draft policies and programs related to homelessness for consideration and input by CoC Board members. These policies and programs have been developed with the goal of preventing the occurrences of homelessness and addressing the housing needs of people experiencing homelessness in the City of Sacramento. City staff recognize that the system of care and resources addressing homelessness goes beyond our jurisdictional boundaries, and so has taken a collaborative and supportive approach with these draft policies and programs.

City staff requests CoC Board input and feedback on these draft policies and programs. Input received will be considered for incorporation into the draft plan, which is scheduled to be released in January 2021.

Action Requested

Review and comment on City of Sacramento Draft Housing Element goals, policies, and programs related to homelessness.

City of Sacramento Housing Element | Draft Policies & Programs

September 2020

6. Homelessness

Goal: Prevent the occurrences of homelessness and address the housing needs of people experiencing homelessness.

Draft Policies

- H.6.1 **Housing First Principles.** The City shall prioritize solutions that are consistent with the notion that stable housing is the first, critical step towards addressing human needs.
- H.6.2 **Regional Coordination.** The City shall coordinate and work with Sacramento County and partner agencies to develop strategies that address homelessness through a shared vision, coordinated programs, and joint funding opportunities.
- H.6.3 **Innovative Solutions.** The City shall consider and employ creative approaches to emergency shelters and interim housing solutions to address the homelessness crisis.
- H.6.4 **Permanent Supportive Housing**. The City shall facilitate and provide permanent supportive housing options that offer appropriate services so that people experiencing chronic homelessness can receive individualized help.
- H.6.5 **Prevention Resources.** The City shall use data to focus on impactful solutions and strategies that target those most at risk of homelessness by connecting them to affordable housing, prevention resources, and supportive services that will help prevent them from losing their homes (e.g., rental assistance programs, tenant protections, and job assistance).
- H.6.6 **Rental Housing Assistance.** The City shall prioritize and facilitate programs and strategies that work to help those experiencing homelessness or are at risk of homelessness find appropriate rental housing quickly through housing identification, rental subsidies, and case management and services.

- H.6.7 **Diversion Approach**. The City shall work with and provide resources to partner organizations to divert households and those at risk of homelessness from entering the shelter system at point of entry.
- H.6.8 **Improve Connections**. The City shall expand and improve the connection between emergency shelters, temporary housing, and permanent housing.
- H.6.9 **Remove Barriers to Access and Improve Effectiveness of Shelters.** The City shall strive to remove barriers to emergency shelter access, and improve the effectiveness of shelters by promoting the rapid exit from shelters to housing.
- H.6.10 **Zoning for Emergency and Supportive Housing.** The City shall amend the zoning code to ensure it complies with State law requirements for supportive housing and Low Barrier Navigation Centers (i.e., service-enriched shelters that focus on moving people into permanent housing).
- H.6.11 **Regular Reporting.** The City shall develop a program to regularly measure and report outcomes of the homeless services and programs.

Implementation Programs

Program 1: County Homeless Plan

The City shall adopt, update, and implement the County Homeless Plan, working with the County to update the plan every five years.

- **Responsible Department:** City Manager's Office (Homeless Services Director)
- **Timing:** Adopt the County Homeless Plan by ____, 2021 and update the plan at least every five years starting in 2023
- **Objective:** Ensure continued regional coordination on homelessness issues

Program 2: Expand Shelter Capacity

The City shall work with the County and partner agencies to expand shelter capacity.

- **Responsible Department:** City Manager's Office (Homeless Services Director)
- **Timing:** To be determined.
- **Objective:** To be determined.

Program 3: Developing Metrics and Reporting

The City shall develop a series of metrics and indicators to track the efficacy of programs and investments. These metrics will be presented annually in a report to the City Council.

- **Responsible Department:** City Manager's Office (Homeless Services Director), Sacramento Steps Forward
- **Timing:** Develop metrics by January 1, 2021 and report to the City Council annually starting in 2022.
- **Objective:** Provide metrics to regular monitor and track investments and programs focused on homelessness and provide transparency in reporting.

Program 4: Zoning Code Amendment for Emergency and Supportive Housing

The City shall amend its zoning code to ensure compliance with State law and encourage emergency and supportive housing.

- The City shall amend the Zoning Code, pursuant to Government Code Sections 65660-65668, to allow Low Barrier Navigation Center developments by right in mixed-use zones and nonresidential zones permitting multifamily uses.
- The City shall amend the Zoning Code, pursuant to Government Code Section 65651(a), to allow for the approval of 100 percent affordable developments that include a percentage of supportive housing units, either 25 percent or 12 units, whichever is greater, to be allowed without a conditional use permit or other discretionary review in all zoning districts where multifamily and mixed-use development is permitted.
 - Responsible Department: Community Development
 - **Timing:** January 1, 2022
 - **Objective:** Bring the zoning code into conformance with recent changes in State law.

HMIS: Housing Inventory Count (HIC)

"....designed to be an accurate reflection of each Continuum of Care's (CoC) capacity to house homeless and formerly homeless persons."



Housing Inventory Count (HIC)

HIC collects information about beds and units by *Program Type, that are available on the designated night.

*Program Types: Permanent Housing Projects (PSH, OPH, PH, RRH) Transitional Housing Projects Emergency Shelters Typically done once per year at the end of January.

Starting in 2019, we had to supply the HMIS project ID to HUD on the HIC, as well.

The self-reported HIC is compared to the actual inventory and clients in HMIS. We are asked to account for any differences.

ALIGNMENT IS KEY!

The Longitudinal System Analysis (LSA) report also dives into each program and takes quarterly HIC and PIT counts.

HUD requires ALL inventory dedicated to serving households who are experiencing Homelessness to be recorded in HMIS. *This includes projects that are not participating in HMIS or receiving HUD funding.*

Projects include:

- Emergency Shelters
- Transitional Housing Projects
- Permanent Housing Projects***

***Permanent Housing Projects include:

- Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH)
- Permanent Housing (PH)
- Other Permanent Housing (OPH)
- Rapid ReHousing (RRH)

Beds vs. Units

Year-round Inventory is divided by Household Type:

- Households without Children (or Adult Only Households)
- Households with Children (or Family Households)
- Child Only Households (usually RHY projects)

Typically units equal households served. For Adult Only and Child Only Households, the bed and unit inventory will be the same.

For Family Households, the bed inventory will typically be the unit inventory multiplied by the average household size that the project serves.

Emergency Shelter Inventory

Bed Availability:

- Year-round Inventory
- Overflow Inventory
- Seasonal Inventory

Bed Type:

- Facility-based
- Voucher
- Other

Projects with Non-Fixed Inventory: Subsidy / Voucher Based Inventory

**Rapid Rehousing projects, some PH and ES projects

HUD Guidance on determining inventory:

"Projects that provide housing rental assistance and have a fixed number of vouchers should determine the number of beds and units based on the number of vouchers currently funded and available for use.

Projects that provide emergency shelter or housing rental assistance vouchers and without a fixed number of units or vouchers (e.g., Emergency Shelter hotel/motel project, Rapid ReHousing, some scattered site PH Permanent Supportive Housing) should determine the number of beds (and units) based on the maximum number of persons (and households) who can be housed on a given night."

Rapid Rehousing Projects

For Rapid Rehousing projects, the inventory that appears on the HIC report is based on program utilization. (The Move-In Date on the Program Enrollment screen.)

Recording RRH inventory in HMIS: RRH Bed Inventories should be updated to show average bed availability during the annual reporting period.

What are we asking Housing Projects to do?

- Check their projects inventory on a quarterly basis at a minimum
- Provide corrections to their inventory to the SSF HMIS Team
- Respond to inventory inquiries from SSF HMIS







Beds By Project Type







Dedicated Beds as a Percent of Total Beds







HMIS Participation Total Beds




HMIS Participation by Project Type









Welcome to the twenty-first weekly report highlighting progress and highlights of the COVID-19 Homeless Response Team's work to implement the **Sacramento COVID-19 Homelessness Response Plan**. This report includes <u>actions to date through Thursday, Sept. 3.</u>

Access to Housing

The next phase of our COVID-19 response shifts focus from temporary to permanent solutions, ending homelessness one person at a time. We've set the ambitious goal of rapidly moving most households from the COVID-19 shelters into permanent housing with support for ongoing stability, or interim housing and shelters when that is not possible. This next phase presents both an unprecedented challenge and a welcome opportunity to significantly impact lives and health over the long term. The general approach is to facilitate program placement and connection to re-housing providers as quickly as possible and to provide additional support to programs and clients on their pathway to permanent housing.

We anticipate changes and innovation during implementation as we tap into the experience, expertise and creativity of all partners.

Strategy 1. Re-housing assistance into existing permanent housing:

- The COVID-19 Team is working with participants across all preventative quarantine sites who are connected to existing re-housing assistance programs. Participating re-housing programs include:
 - o Supportive Services for Veteran Families
 - City's Pathways to Health + Home
 - o County's Behavioral Health Re-Housing Services
 - CoC's Shelter Plus Care Program

- County Flexible Housing Pool (existing and expanded with COVID funding)
- The expanded County Flexible Housing Pool (FHP) re-housing program is anticipated to facilitate approximately 200 housing placements; and
- Funding Room and Board placements, serving approximately 25 households.
- In addition, the CoC has temporarily modified the Coordinated Entry prioritization criteria through the end of the year to include COVID vulnerabilities. As permanent supportive housing becomes available through the coordinated entry process, participants in the COVID sites will be placed through coordinated entry.

Progress over the past few weeks includes:

- Re-Housing Program Leads have been identified to liaison with providers in their program area, encouraging, problem solving, and tracking progress. All programs are now engaging with clients and offering re-housing services.
- Re-Housing Program Leads had their first orientation meeting on August 19 and second meeting was held on August 26, inviting broader community partners to brainstorm ways to remove barriers and connect participants to services that support housing placement and stability. Promising connections were explored in: In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS), employment services, substance use programs, rehabilitation centers, medically assisted treatment program to name a few.
- The first cohort of 25 participants were referred to an expanded County Flexible Housing program. Households are being prioritized based on age and the first group began with participants residing at the motel site closing at the end of September. In the coming days, participants will be connected to community providers offering intensive case management and property related services through the FHP program.

Onsite Navigation and Problem Solving

In addition to connecting to re-housing programs, a onsite navigation/problem solving team comprised of SSF navigators, Goodwill staff and DHA social workers has been organized to engage and support participants in their transition to permanent housing, when possible, or temporary shelter. Progress includes:

- Deployment of a strengths-based housing assessment of all willing participants across all sites;
- Beginning at the first preventative quarantine site on September 1, team members began meeting with each household problem solve housing pathways and services;

- A new problem-solving financial assistance program is nearly ready to launch. It will assist households who are able to secure permanent housing with one-time, limited financial assistance.
- Also underway is the development of a re-housing program in the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) that will assist re-housing case managers and provide the basis for ongoing reporting. More to come on this in future reports.

Strategy 2. Development of new permanent supportive housing through motel acquisition and conversion:

This strategy would take advantage of the opportunity to purchase motels or other real estate for use as permanent supportive housing for persons experiencing homelessness. Four applications from SHRA and the City have been submitted to the State under Project Homekey. The State received \$1 billion of requests for a \$600 million program. The Sacramento applications are as follows:

- SHRA and Jamboree Housing Corporation application for the Hawthorne Suites in the Richards Boulevard area.
- SHRA and Mercy Housing application for the Woodspring Suites on La Mancha Way in south Sacramento.
- The City of Sacramento and WEAVE, Inc. application for nine manufactured housing units.
- The City of Sacramento and Saint John's Program for Real Change application for 20 manufactured housing and efficiency units.

In addition, housing efforts continue more broadly:

• Since April 8, 62 families have moved into permanent housing from the City's Pathways and the County's Flexible Supportive Housing Program with a Housing Choice Voucher.

Isolation/Quarantine Units for Persons Experiencing Homelessness

As an emergency response to COVID-19, medically supported isolation care centers, and preventative quarantine care centers have been temporarily funded to provide safe places for people experiencing homelessness who are COVID+, symptomatic or otherwise highly vulnerable.

Ensuring Safety and Health for Persons Living Outdoors

This strategy is focused around providing coordinated support to people who are unsheltered to remain safely in place per CDC guidance to slow the spread of COVID-19.

• Since efforts began April 8, teams have installed 58 handwashing stations and 52 toilets in 40 locations. The placement of these stations is dynamic, and equipment may be moved.

- As the COVID-19 Homelessness Response Team shifts its focus to rehousing the Project Roomkey guests, the enhanced outreach to encampments for access to these rooms has ended. During the course of their regular duties, outreach workers still conduct the assessments with people who are COVID+ or awaiting test results to access medical isolation trailers. However, the majority of these entries come directly through hospitals and other health care providers.
- Additional funding through the County Department of Health Services has been identified to continue encampment services through the end of December.
- During this reporting period, 14 pallets (288 gallons) of water were distributed to encampments throughout the county. The three pathways of delivery are the volunteer network, SANE and Loaves & Fishes.

COVID Testing

County Public Health in partnership with medical partners are completing robust COVID-19 testing at shelters, encampments and isolation/quarantine care centers with the goal of being able to do widespread testing to ensure the health and safety of people experiencing homelessness.

(HHAP) Round 2

On September 1, the California Homeless Coordinating and Financing Council (HCFC) released the funding allocations for Round 2 of the Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program (HHAP). This second round is a \$300 million grant to support local jurisdictions in building on efforts developed through the first round of HHAP and other State funding, and to develop a unified regional response to homelessness.

The Sacramento region will be receiving the following HHAP Round 2 allocations:

Sacramento Continuum of Care: \$3,099,643

• City of Sacramento: \$6,454,953

• County of Sacramento: \$2,774,367

While a timeline for this second round of funding is still being developed by the State, HCFC has indicated that the application will be released in early November 2020. Program guidance for Round 2 has not yet been released, but the enabling statute AB 83 indicates that Round 2 will be distributed "in a manner similar to existing provisions of the program and used for similar purposes."
