






Adults, families, and youth experience homelessness at different rates.

Systemic Factors Contributing to Homelessness



Homelessness is a complex issue for which there is no single cause or solution, and it is not an inherent fault of the individual. In Sacramento, similar to other communities, there are systemic factors that are linked with contributing to homelessness.

A competitive housing market with **low vacancy rates** makes it difficult for persons experiencing homelessness to secure housing (rates declined from **6.5% to 2.5%** in the last decade)

Wages & Rental Costs³



In California, the statewide **minimum wage** is





In Sacramento County, the **cost** for a 1-bedroom apartment at Fair Market Rent is

\$1,188



The number of combined work hours at minimum wage a person must work to afford a 1-bedroom apartment is

65/wk



The disparity between **wages** and **rental costs** presents as a burden to housing stability both for renters and people experiencing homelessness to maintain stable housing.

Affordable Housing⁴



An estimated **36,014** units of affordable housing for very low-income to low income are required over the next **8 years** to meet the community housing needs across Sacramento County







What is a Homeless Continuum of Care?



A Continuum of Care (CoC) is a regional or local planning body that coordinates housing and services to meet the specific needs of people experiencing homelessness as they move to stable housing and maximize self-sufficiency.

Who comprises the Sacramento CoC?

The Sacramento City and County Continuum of Care (Sacramento CoC) is comprised of a <u>25-member board</u> which includes representation from local government, homeless services providers, people with lived experience, and the broader community of businesses, advocates, and faith-based groups.



Where is the Sacramento CoC situated in the community?


The Sacramento CoC is situated at a nexus for homelessness related efforts and is both informed by and helps to inform the work of our community partners.



^{*}In Sacramento, the CoC has designated SSF as the CoC Lead Agency serving as the Collaborative Funding Applicant, Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) Lead Agency, and operator for the Coordinated Entry System.

What does the Sacramento CoC do?

The work of the Sacramento CoC is organized into 4 main components:



Operating the CoC includes board and committee management, project and system performance review, and the coordination of access to resources.



Local planning efforts to assess and understand our community's needs and direct resources accordingly.




Designating the local Lead



 Explores several community-driven efforts to advance racial equity and re-imagine our homelessness system as being fully inclusive, anticipatory, and responsive.


Joining a Breakout Session
