Explanation of How the Proposed Use of Funds Will Complement Existing local, state, and federal funds and equitably close the gaps identified in the Local Landscape Analysis

The CoC's HHAP-3 proposed funding allocations builds upon the prior rounds of HHAP-1 and HHAP-2 funding and focuses on system-wide improvements. The Sacramento Local Homeless Action Plan identified as it's first priority building and scaling a Coordinated Access System, which the majority of the HHAP-3 funding allocation is recommended for. A recent gaps analysis also identifies the high need for prevention and diversion funds to stem the inflow of people becoming homeless. \$5,258,200 of this request crosses multiple HHAP-3 eligible use categories (system support, diversion, and outreach) and is part of a larger, CoC, City, and County of Sacramento multi-year budget of \$12,422,676 to support implementation and operation of a Coordinated Access System.
