Monthly HMIS Metrics Report July 2023

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About this Report

This report shares monthly metrics from the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS), our database for collecting information on persons who engage with the Homeless Response System (HRS) within the Sacramento area. Collectively, these metrics can be used to better measure the state of homelessness in our community.

Our community is an active member of the Built For Zero movement, a national methodology for measuring and equitably ending homelessness. Part of that membership includes maintaining a comprehensive data source of every person in our community who is experiencing homelessness, the *By-Name List*, or as our community calls it, the *Community Queue*.¹ By actively maintaining our Community Queue, we can capture when people enter or exit homelessness. Many of the metrics shared in this report are based on methodology developed by Built for Zero.

Active Homeless Population

This section shares the current count of people who are actively homeless according to our Community Queue and the demographics of that population.

Current Counts

As of July 2023, 9,031 people were reported to be actively homeless while 2,400 were actively enrolled in emergency shelters. The following figure shares these data counts for the last 12 months.²

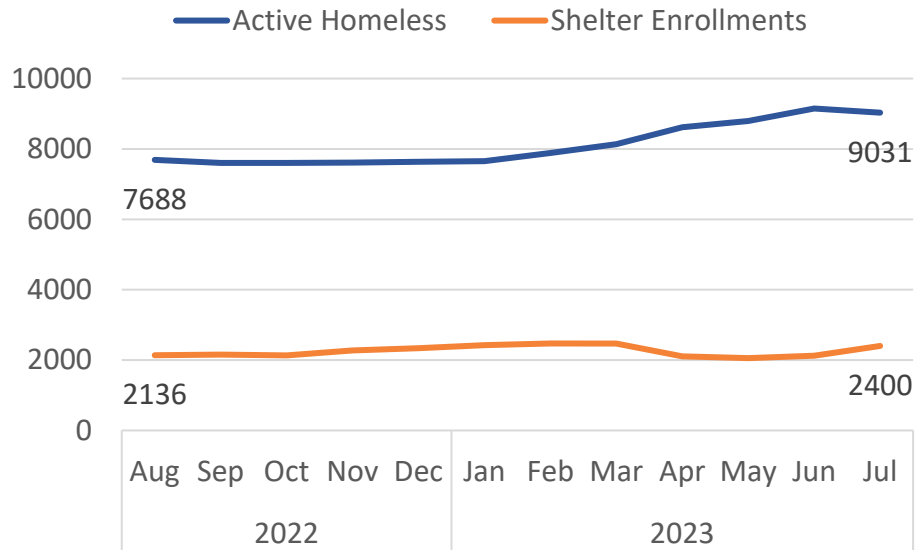


Figure 1. Monthly Active Homeless Counts for the Last 12 Months.

The Community Queue considers the experiences of each person experiencing homelessness and assigns a single status to describe their situation.³ The following figure shares the counts of this population for each status.

³ Sheltered counts on the Community Queue will be lower than the count of active enrollments because it considers all intervention activity associated with a client. For example, there are cases where an individual has an active enrollment in a shelter and an active enrollment in a street outreach program.

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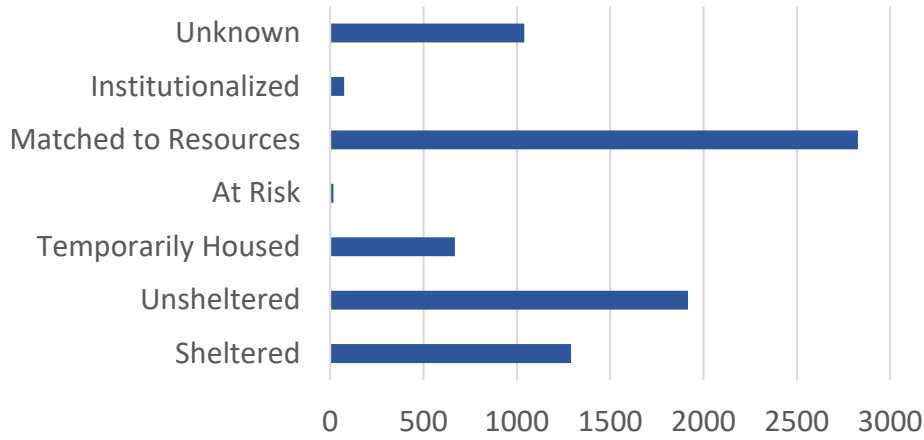


Figure 2. Active Homeless Population Statuses for the Current Month.

Demographics

Demographics included in this report include race, ethnicity, agency, gender, and household type.⁴

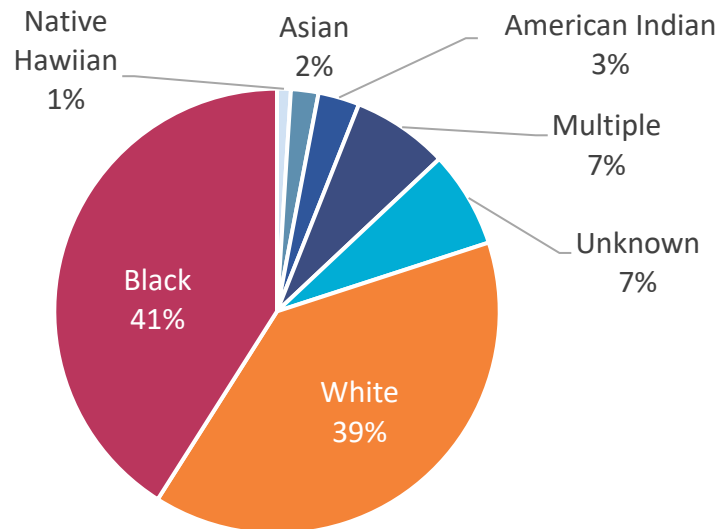


Figure 3. Active Homeless Population by Race.

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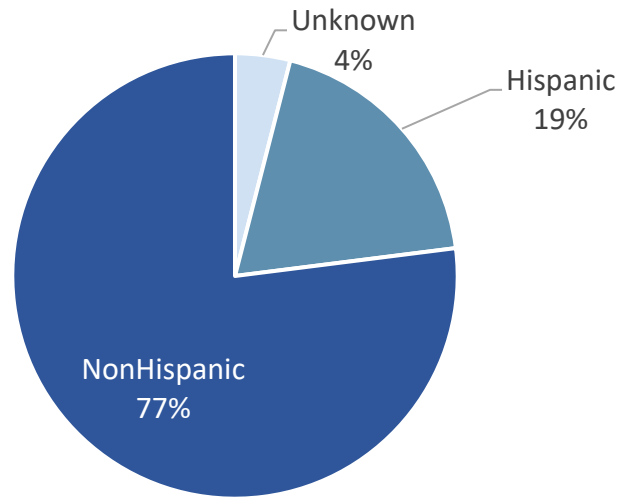


Figure 4. Active Homeless Population by Ethnicity.

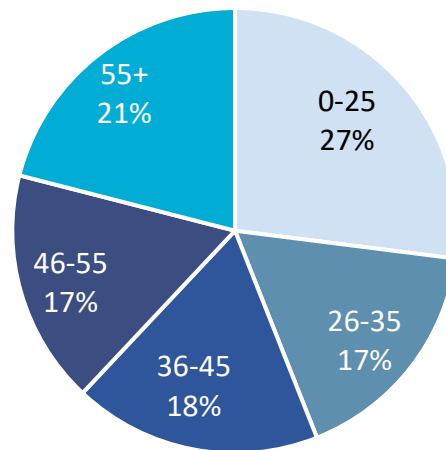


Figure 5. Active Homeless Population by Age Group.

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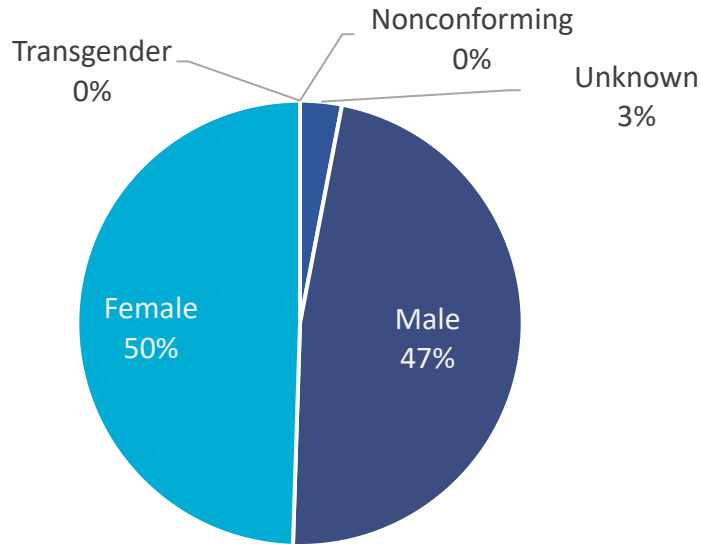


Figure 6. Active Homeless Population by Gender.

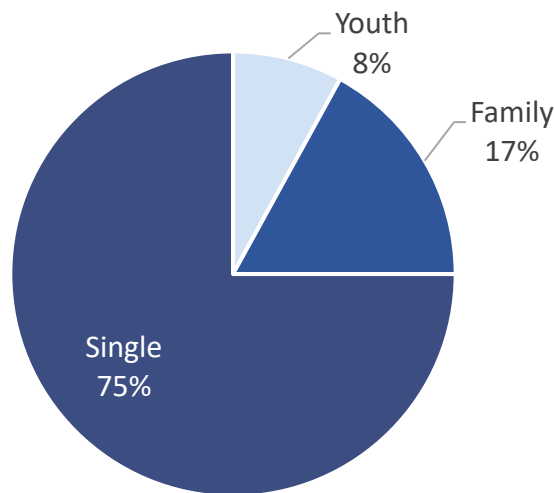


Figure 7. Active Homeless Population by Household Type.

Inflow and Outflow

The section shares the number of people entering and exiting (“flow”) engagement with the HRS. Each month, the Community Queue is updated with the current list of actively homeless individuals. Inflow occurs when new

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individuals are added to the Community Queue. Outflow occurs when individuals leave the Community Queue.⁵

Community Queue Flow

During July 2023, 1,990 people entered the system of care (“inflow”) and 2,539 people exited the HRS (“outflow”).

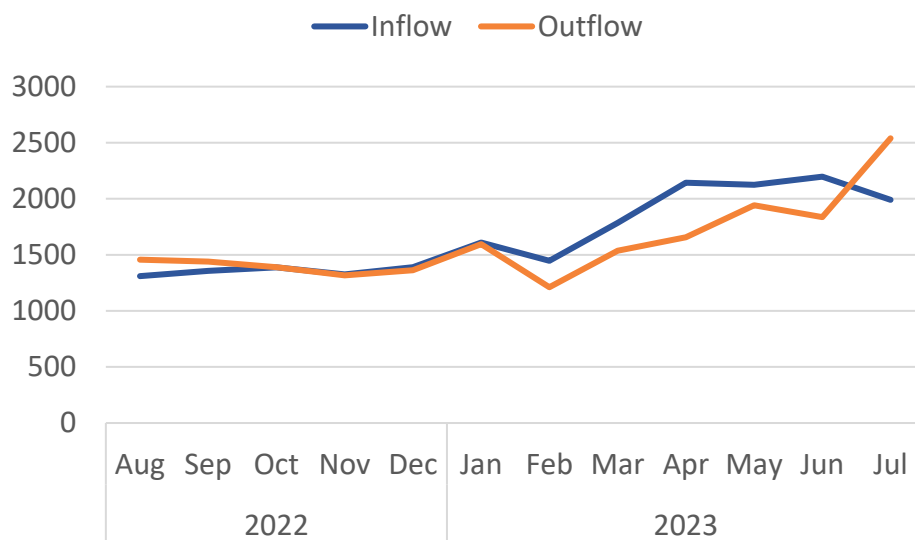


Figure 8. Community Queue Inflow and Outflow for the Last 12 Months.

During July 2023, 549 more people exited the system than entered. The following figure shares the net change in flow monthly for the last year. Net flow is calculated as the difference between the number of people who entered the system and the number of people who exited each month. If net flow is positive, then more people entered than exited system of care for the month. If net flow is negative, then more people exited than entered the system of care for the month.

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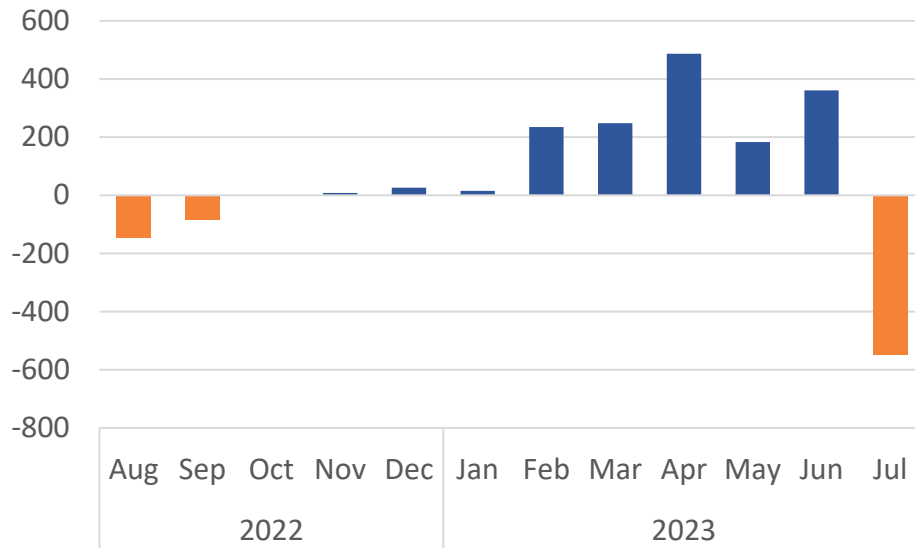


Figure 9. Net Flow into Homelessness for the Last 12 Months.

Intervention Exits

There are many different types of interventions available for people experiencing homelessness in our community. Intervention types available from our HRS include homelessness prevention (HP), transitional housing (TH), street outreach (SO), supportive services only (SSO), emergency shelter (ES), rapid re-housing (RRH), permanent supportive housing (PSH), and other permanent housing (OPH).

Interventions from the HRS reported 1,745 exits from all projects combined. The following figure reports on exit destinations across all intervention types.⁶

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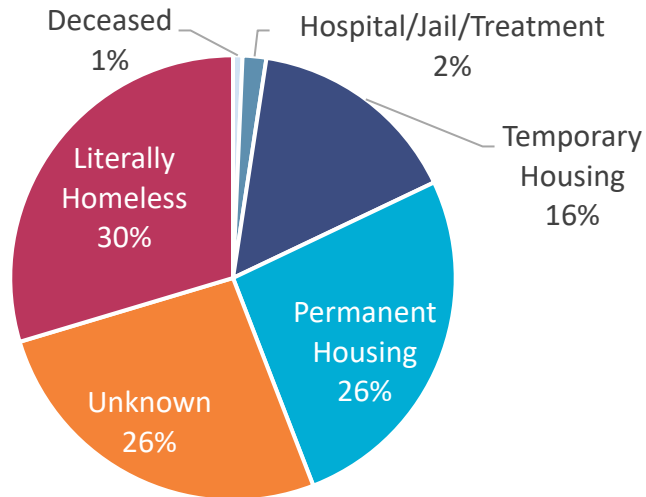


Figure 10. Share of Exits by Destination Type

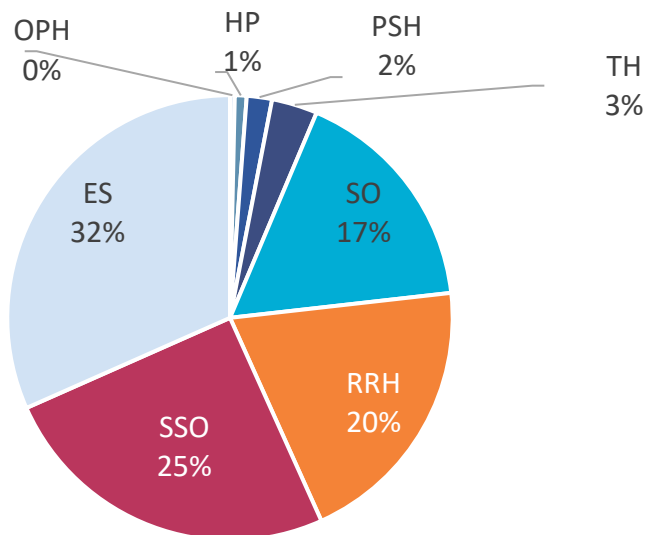


Figure 11. Exits by Intervention Type.

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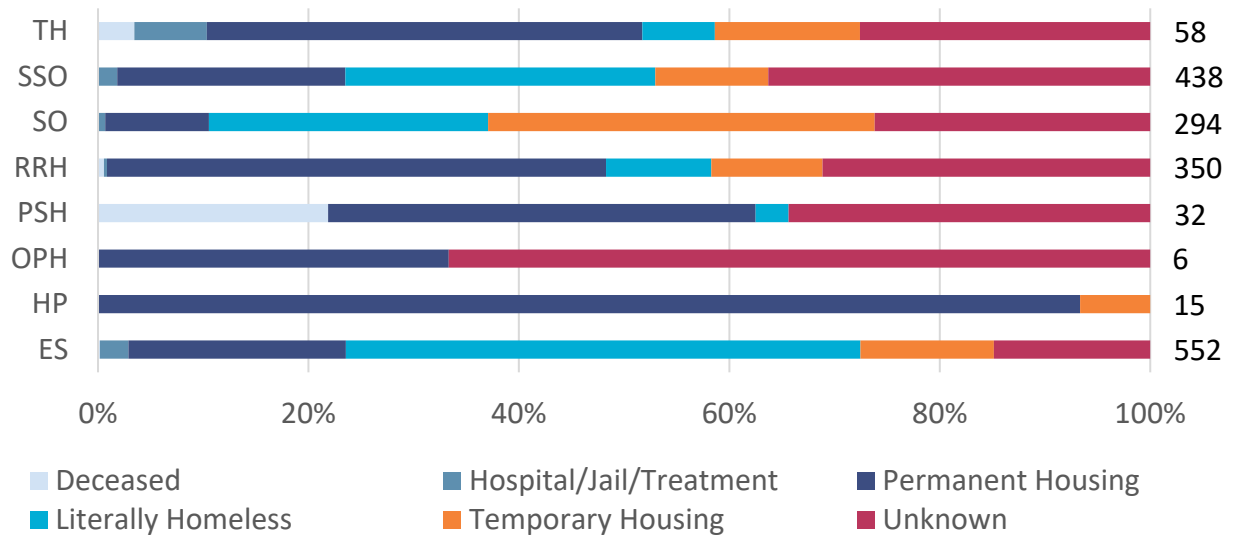


Figure 12. Share of Exit Destinations by Intervention Type.

Note. These statuses are assigned based on a client's engagement with the Homelessness Response System as entered by service providers. Institutionalized: the activity indicates the client exited to an institutional destination. At Risk: the activity does not sufficiently demonstrate a client is experiencing homelessness. Matched to Resources: this is the default status which requires the activity sufficiently demonstrates homelessness but is not clearly indicative of anything more. Sheltered: the activity indicates the client is currently housed by a shelter-like program. Temporarily Housed: the activity indicates the client is currently housed by a Temporary Housing or Rapid Re-Housing program. Unknown: the activity indicates the client exited to an unknown destination. Unsheltered: the activity or exit destination indicates the client is currently residing in a place not meant for human habitation.

Note. Inflow: new clients to our system who were (re)identified during the reporting period. Newly Identified: clients new to homelessness, or those who have at least 2 years since their last episode of homelessness or HMIS activity. Returned from Housing: clients who identified their prior residence as having been a positive, permanent destination. Return from Inactive: clients who returned to homelessness after a period equal to or longer than the inactivity threshold since their last activity. Outflow - clients who are no longer homeless. Housing Placements: clients who have been moved in by a permanent housing (non-RRH) program or who exited to a positive, permanent destination. Moved to Inactive: clients who exited for any other reason but more generally have been inactive for a period equaling or greater than the inactivity threshold (Deceased is included here).
